Happy 2024! We have loved welcoming our children back to school after the Christmas break. It was a very successful end of term. The performances were fabulous and it was wonderful to welcome so many families into our school.

The children have settled so well back into school and we have been very impressed with their positive attitudes. We are going to be extending our values to include two more. We have asked our school community and will be unveiling these in the next few weeks. These will be linked to children's learning in the classroom and to encourage our children to be brave and independent learners.

HOMEWORK

We know that children learn best when they practise. It helps them gain competence and helps them to improve. Even when pupils have mastered something, practising still has benefits: it reinforces the basic skills that they need in order to learn more advanced skills, it protects against forgetting and practice helps them to apply their knowledge and skills in different ways. Because of this, we would like all pupils to complete weekly homework. Please check out our website for information and guides about how best you can support your child.

The homework is designed to help pupils to practise while respecting family time. We do not set big projects that require lots of time and resources, or long writing tasks. ATTENDANCE

This week, you will receive a letter which informs you of your child's attendance percentage to date.

We place great importance on attendance and punctuality at Brundall School. The national average for attendance is 96%. For your child to be in line with this and get the most out of their school experience both academically and socially, they need to attend at least 177 out of 190 days per year. Absences will mean children missing lessons from units of work, which may make it harder for them to understand concepts when they return to school.

If your child arrives late, they are likely to miss reading and spelling sessions, which usually happen at the beginning of the day. This may mean they do not make the progress they could if they were on time.

Whilst we realise that some absences and lateness cannot be avoided, we want to work with families to find solutions which maximise learning opportunities for all children. Please come and talk to us or visit the attendance page on our website if you have any questions about this. Schools have a statutory responsibility to report attendance to parents.

UNIFORM

Our School Uniform Policy

Children are expected to be physically active every day; they should come to school ready to be active. The uniform has many options so children can choose what they feel most comfortable in whilst still giving us a united feel. If children do not come in uniform, we will lend them a school sweatshirt or a fleece.

Our School Uniform

- A white or red polo shirt, which may have a logo on it
- Plain (no logos or lines) grey or black trousers (These can be sports style shorts, jogging bottoms or leggings but they must be plain with no logos or stripes. Children can wear cycling shorts under their skirts), shorts, skirt or pinafore
- A red and white gingham dress
- A red sweatshirt, which may have the logo on it
- A red cardigan, which may have the logo on it
- A red logoed fleece
- A grey logoed hooded sweatshirt
- Flat, black shoes or ankle boots
- Any coloured trainers

Children may wear trainers or bring trainers to change in to for PE, they are not allowed to wear make-up and nail varnish. The only jewellery allowed are stud earrings which can be worn for PE. Watches can be worn but must be removed for PE.

All of these logoed items, as well as book bags are available to order on the school website.

For Swimming

- Trunks (not board shorts) or a one piece swimming costume
- A swimming hat
- A towel
- Goggles may be worn

NUT FREE SCHOOL

Can we please remind you we are a nut free school.

Children who suffer from nut allergies can develop a severe, potentially lifethreatening allergic reaction.

If someone has a nut allergy it is not just eating nuts that can cause a severe reaction, just being touched on the skin or smelling the breath of someone who has had nuts or a product containing nuts can trigger anaphylactic shock (which can cause breathing and swallowing difficulties).

First aid staff in the school are trained to use the Epi-pens (an injection of adrenalin) which is required immediately if this happens.

We cannot have nuts in school in any form.

So please can we ask that you have no nut products in the lunch boxes or brought into the school as treats.

For example:

Peanut butter sandwiches

Chocolate spreads

Cereal bars

Some granola bars

Cakes that contain nuts

Biscuits / Cookies that contain nuts

Peanut butter cake

This list is not exhaustive, so please check the packaging of products closely.

DRESSING APPROPRIATELY FOR SCHOOL

With the temperatures dropping, it's important to make sure your children are dressed appropriately for school. Please ensure that they come in with a coat, as the weather can change quickly, even if it's sunny in the morning. It's also recommended to send in hats, gloves, and scarves, especially if they'll be playing outside during break, unless it's raining heavily. Don't forget to label all belongings clearly with your child's name.
