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Nut Free School Reminder



We would like to kindly remind you that we are a nut-free school. This is an important measure to protect children who suffer from nut allergies, as they can develop a severe, potentially life-threatening allergic reaction.

It is important to note that it is not only consuming nuts that can cause a severe reaction – simply being touched by someone who has had nuts, or smelling the breath of someone who has eaten nuts or a product containing nuts, can also trigger anaphylactic shock. This can result in breathing and swallowing difficulties and requires immediate medical intervention.

Our first aid staff are trained to use Epi-pens (an injection of adrenaline), which is required if a reaction occurs. However, to ensure the safety of all children, we cannot have nuts in school in any form.

Please ensure that no nut products are included in your child's lunch box or brought into school as treats. Some examples of nut-containing products to avoid include:

- Peanut butter sandwiches
- Chocolate spreads
- Cereal bars
- Granola bars
- · Cakes that contain nuts
- Biscuits / Cookies with nuts
- · Peanut butter cakes
- Some Asian foods (including satay)
- Sauces containing nuts

This list is not exhaustive, so we strongly encourage you to check the packaging of products carefully.

We understand that this is an extra step, but we ask for your full cooperation in keeping our school nut-free. If this were your child with a life-threatening allergy, we are sure you would want all of us to take every precaution.

If you have any questions or concerns, please don't hesitate to speak to a member of staff.


